Together with BRAVEAURORA, the Ghanaian social welfare has been able to close **23 orphanages** and reintegrate and support **757 children** back into their extended families.

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WHAT IS BRAVEAURORA AND WHERE IS IT BASED?

OUR MISSION/OUR GOAL

To take a pioneering role in the field of child protection in Northern Ghana and foster the reunification of children with their families.

CHILD PROTECTION IN GHANA - WHY?

- One in four children under the age of five has no birth certificate (1.2 million children in Ghana)
- One in five children doesn't live with their parents
- More than 3,500 children live in institutions
- Almost 90% of children are exposed to psychological aggression, one in five children experiences physical abuse
- Child labour affects one in five children
- One in five girls is married off as a child
- One in 50 girls is a victim of genital mutilation
- More than 13,000 images and videos of child sexual abuse are uploaded annually in Ghana
- Almost 3/4 of all children in Ghana are affected by poverty (Source: UNICEF 2021)

Illegal orphanages are closed and children are reunited with their families ("reintegration"). We offer training and further education programs in our training center and support and promote school education.

BRAVEAURORA doesn't create any dependencies with its projects! By constantly exchanging both knowledge and experience with the community, our local experts, staff and cooperation partners, it enables us to sustainably generate new sources of income for our partner communities. In order to successfully scale our projects, we start by actively involving the community - including children and teenagers.


TRANSPARENCY

independent auditors check our financial report following strict criteria. In 2013, BRAVEAURORA was awarded the Austrian Donation Seal of Quality, meaning that donations to BRAVEAURORA are tax deductible.

SUSTAINABILITY

BRAVEAURORA wants to empower the communities themselves to adopt new methods and to apply their knowledge, ensuring their independence. In the long run, our projects aim to achieve the best possible social impact for the community. We don't want to leave any traces and aim to gradually hand over projects to the community.

MILESTONES 2022

One of our biggest milestones in 2022 were a very valuable partnership with the Vibrant Village Foundation which enabled us to onboard seven communities. These new communities will benefit from our core interventions in the areas of: child protection. livelihood promotion, and education.

In addition, the team made several gains in the area of child protection including reunifying children with their families, sending children back to school, preventing early and forced marriages, among others. A key highlight in the year however was the partnership with the Vibrant Village Foundation to rollout our core programs in seven deprived communities within the West Mamprusi Municipality. Through the partnership, we will be able to provide holistic support to the children, women and families in the communities.

We have already rolled out our education, livelihood and child protection interventions in these communities! There is also news from Austria! After more than 8 years of commitment to BRAVEAURORA, our dear Alea Pleiner is stepping down as a board member at the end of 2022. She continues to carry our common vision in her heart, regardless of her position. Thank you for everything, dear Alea!

Reintegration and fight against illegal orphanages In 2022, our team was able to reach 2,125 people in 24 communities

(669 men and 1,456 women) on the risks of growing up in an orphanage.

FIGHT AGAINST ILLEGAL ORPHANAGES

n Ghana, thousands of children live in orphanages. From 1996 to 2006, the number of orphanages increased from 23 to 148. But why are so many children in Ghana orphaned? The answer is sad: poverty, discrimination, and benefit tourism. To satisfy the need of voluntourists, social orphans are created across orphanages. Two out of three children in Ghana, who live in an orphanage, are not orphans.

Nevertheless, the best place for children to grow up is their own family, which gives them love and security.

BRAVEAURORA is therefore working with the Department of Social Welfare and other partners in Ghana to educate people about the dangers of orphanage-based care.

We do this through empowering individuals, families, communities, and child protection actors. Our empowerment efforts are to support proper gatekeeping and ensure that children enjoy love and protection in families.



TRAINING OF CHILDCARE PROFESSIONALS

on foster care

s the Civil Society Organisation representative on the North East Regional Foster Care Placement Committee, BRAVEAURORA partnered with the Regional office of the Department of Social Welfare to train staff and partners on foster care. The two-day training brought together social welfare and community development officers from the 6 districts of the region, Domestic Violence and Victim Support Unit officers, psychologists, and social workers. Gabriel, a social worker with a residential home for children, expressed that **"the training is an eye opener for me.** It is detailed and down to earth. It gives me the hope that foster care is a viable alternative to residential care. I am happy Brave Aurora made this possible."

REINTEGRATION OF 22 CHILDREN INTO THEIR FAMILIES

tatistics show that 121 orphanages with more than 3,540 children are operating in Ghana. In the northern regions of Ghana, where BRAVEAURORA works, there are at least 17 orphanages with around 500 children. In 2022, the Department of Social Welfare and BRAVEAURORA were able to reunite 22 children from five orphanages in the Northern Region, Upper West Region, and Upper East Region of Ghana with their families. BRAVEAURORA continues to support social welfare with the active monitoring (further support and control) of the children to ensure that they are doing well in their families.

Supporting

MUNICIPAL CHILD PROTECTION **COMMITTEES**

RAVEAURORA has supported the establishment of an official child protection committee for the welfare of children in the West Mamprusi Municipality.

This committee consists of officers from the Police, Social Welfare, Commission on Human Rights and Administrative Justice (CHRAJ), National Commission for Civic Education (NCCE), Ghana Health Service (GHS), Ghana Educational Service (GES), traditional and religious leaders, youth groups and other NGOs. The aim of the committee is to stand up for the rights of children and to protect children from abuse and exploitation.





WOMEN'S VOICE AND LEADERSHIP PROJECT

RAVEAURORA is collaborating with PLAN International Gha-na on the Women's Voice and Leadership Project. Funded by Global Affairs Canada, this six-month project aims to improve the situation of girls in rural areas. Girls and young women should be empowered to deal with their bodies, their menstruation, and their physical and mental health in a self-determined manner. Six girls' clubs have been formed in six communities in the West Mamprusi and Mamprugu Moagduri districts.



Young Ambassadors for Reintegration

YAP-PROJECT

he YAP (Young Ambassadors Project = young ambassadors of reintegration) comes into play when children are successfully re-integrated into their families. Former "orphans" and their caregivers visit the northern regions, together with our social workers and officers of DSW, to discuss the reintegration into their family and the topic of "voluntourism", educating the population about support opportunities. The care leavers are trained as ambassadors (multipliers = disseminators) and report from their own experience, how their time in an orphanage influenced them and what advantages they see in growing up in a family structure.

In 2022, the team was able to reach a total of 2,125 people in 24 communities.

Moreover, there were seven radio programs in the North East region on child protection and illegal orphanages, reaching approximately 26,000 people.

As a reward for their great work, the YAP team was given a trip to Zipline Drone Delivery Center in Walewale. Here, they were taken through how essential drugs and medical necessities are quickly delivered to the remotest parts of Ghana.



PARENTS' CLASS AND KIDS' ENGAGEMENT

n 2022, a total of 431 children and 290 parents in our partner communities were reached with "parents class" and "kids engagements". The meetings discussed topics such as child development, the role of the family in healthy development, issues children face, gender roles, support systems, healthy eating and much more.

PSYCHOSOCIAL COUNSELLING FOR 78 PEOPLE

ne Social Advisory and Counselling Service is aimed at people who find themselves in extremely challenging circumstances. The most common issues dealt with by the team are early school dropouts, domestic violence, teenage pregnancy, and marriage breakdowns. In 2022, 78 individuals and families were supported in psychosocial counselling.

308 students were also reached through awareness creation efforts on Counselling.



GIRLS' EMPOWERMENT CLUBS IN LOCAL COMMUNITIES

n addition to the Women's Voice and Leadership Project, BRAVE-AURORA was able to give a voice to 140 other young women between the ages of 14 and 25. Topics in the Girls Club meetings were: menstrual hygiene, professional advice, rights and obligations, youth protection guidelines, gender roles, and much more.



Giving 140 Young Women a Voice!



BRAVEAURORA provides women and their families with new perspectives through education and training, so that they can provide for themselves and their families.

Women like Munira can found a startup and many are now even training apprentices themselves.

> ince the beginning of the year 2022, prices of goods and services in Ghana, just as in other parts of the world, have been on the rise due to inflationary pressures. The manifestation of inflationary pressures, coupled with fuel price increment, depreciation of the Ghana Cedi, and exchange rate challenges have resulted in the reduction in house incomes, high cost of living, and deteriorated standard of living, hence economic hardship. For example, a loaf of bread, which was sold for GHS 6 at the beginning of the year is now sold for GHS 12 and GHS 15 (an increase of about 100 and 150 percent. The majority of the rural population lives from agriculture. The yields depend on the weather and so do the food rations

for the family. Due to global climatic changes, the dry season is getting longer and longer, and with it the months in which people are unable to earn any income. Around 3.4 million people in Ghana still live in acute poverty. Because they have to support their parents (e.g. in the fields), many students are forced to drop out of school after middle school due to poverty. The opportunities for school dropouts to learn new skills in job training are few. For these reasons, the BRAVEAURORA training centre was founded - people are empowered here to find their own way out of poverty and to be able to take care of themselves and their families in the long term.

One of these young women without young women was Munira.

Munira is 29, lives in Ghana and has 3 children. However, the fact that she can feed her children could not be taken for granted for a long time. For many years, Munira was a Kayaye. This is the name given to mothers who regularly have to leave their children alone to go to cities to sell drinking water, or carry loads on their head, for example. A job that barely feeds the family. And it certainly doesn't pay enough to finance their own education.

The "Kayaye" are often exploited, experience physical violence, suffer from health problems or end up in prostitution.

Together, we were able to provide training to more than 1,100 people like Munira - and that's just the beginning. Now, the trainings are also mobile and could be expanded to seven more communities in 2022.

RAVEAURORA works with the NVTI, the state institute for job training, to be able to give graduates official certificates for their training. Graduates can prove their knowledge in proficiency tests, which,

after successfully passing the test, enables them to work independently or as an employee. We are very proud that all 15 plumbing trainees passed the exams in 2022.

Business Mentoring for

150 NEW ENTRE-PRENEURS

n 2022, we monitored 150 entrepreneurs to evaluate how well they are doing in self-employment and where they are currently encountering difficulties in the world of work.



70 STARTER PACKS DISTRIBUTED

or the second time running, successful graduates received starter packages with materials and information needed to start their businesses. Each starter package has been tailored to the needs of the recipient. On the one hand, seminars and courses were offered on topics such as business management skills in the areas of money management, financial literacy, managing cooperatives, branding as well as marketing their products. The start-up kits included different kinds of beads, needles, sandals, pliers, fishing lines for beads makers. Chemicals for making bar and liquid soaps, cutting boards for bar soap, and hydrometers among others. This followed their completion of a one to six-month-long training from craft persons in trades of their choice such as beads, soap, soya utilization, shoemaking, and smock tailoring. A ceremony was held in Guabuliga to distribute the start-up kits to the beneficiaries comprising ten in shoemaking, 20 smock tailors, 20 in beads design, 10 in soya utilisation and 10 in soap making to begin their income-generating activities.



IMPLEMENTATION OF SAVING-ASSOCIATIONS

e have established a Village Savings and Loan Association (VSLA) in six communities. Each group consists of 15-30 members who save together and thereby finance small loans by themselves. The term is approximately one year, after which the accumulated savings and profits from the loans are divided proportionately among the members. Although men are welcome to participate, all of our associations are currently female-only - a total of 270 women participated in these associations.



THE SUCCESS **STORY OF AMINA ISSIFU**

mina is 40 years old and a native of Guabuliga. After junior high school, she could not continue to senior high school because both her parents come for herself and her family. She passed away that same year and the extended family could not pay for her senior high school education.

CONTINUING EDUCATION WORKSHOPS FOR 54 TEACHERS



total of 54 teachers were trained in 2022 in Jolly Phonics and Basic ICT Tools. The training supported teachers in the active BRAVEAURORA schools in effectively adopting the play based methodology in teaching and learning. I also enhanced the skill of teachers in ICT.

EXTRA CLASSES FOR 540 STUDENTS

elementary and middle school students. The tutoring sessions are designed to support children with basic reading and numeracy.







SCHOLARSHIPS FOR 12 PARTICU-LARLY TALENTED STUDENTS

n 2022, 12 students received financial support to advance their senior high school and tertiary education.

Many thanks to our former project manager Severin Schwaiger, for supporting three of these students in senior high schools.

TEACHING MATERIAL DONATIONS **TO TEACHERS**

40 new curriculum textbooks together with assorted learning materials were distributed to partner schools. The program also supported the renovation of blackboards and the construction of a child-friendly pavilion. The support was organized in view of the poor and irregular government allocation of resources to schools.





ACADEMIC **AMBASSADORS** PROJECT

o alleviate the shortage of trained teaching staff, selected volunteer teachers received a scholarship for teacher training from BRAVEAURORA. So far, 11 teachers have successfully completed their training due to this project.

BRAVEAURORA BECAME PART OF THE WORLDWIDE

ALLIANCE FOR CHILD PROTECTION IN HUMANITARIAN ACTION

n 2022, BRAVEAURORA joined the Alliance for the Protection of Children in Humanitarian Action.

This alliance is a global, cross-sectoral network of non-profit organisations, academic institutions, policy makers, donors and professionals. The Alliance's vision is a world where children are protected from abuse, neglect, exploitation and violence.

BRAVEAURORA will also join the Family Strengthening Task Force within the Alliance to ensure better psychological well-being of children and develop standards that focus on effective and high-quality child protection. The knowledge gained in Ghana will be shared and discussed with other members of the alliance worldwide.


