

Our Vision, Our Mission













OUR VISION, OUR MISSION

s an organisation dedicated to improving the lives of children, we took an important step in 2023 to rethink and redefine our core values and long-term goals.

WE ENVISION A THRIVING SOCIETY WHERE EVERY CHILD IS SAFE AND PROTECTED, AND LIVES TO FULFIL THEIR FULL POTENTIAL.

OUR MISSION IS TO CREATE BETTER LIVING CONDITIONS FOR CHILDREN IN GHANA, WHO ARE IMPACTED BY POVERTY, TO ENABLE THEM TO GROW UP HEALTHILY, IN THEIR FAMILIES AND LIVE IN DIGNITY.

Children are at the centre of our work and all our projects. Why? Children are among the most vulnerable members of our society. They are particularly hard hit by the negative effects of poverty, hunger and other crises.

Child protection is essential because children are physically and mentally less resilient than adults. Early negative experiences can shape their entire lives, which is why it is so important to protect them from such experiences. Children have a fundamental right to protection and care, and upholding these rights is a social responsibility.

Investing in the protection and promotion of children contributes to a stable and prosperous society. Effective child protection prevents abuse such as child labour, human trafficking and sexual exploitation. In addition, protecting children enables their education and development, breaking the cycle of poverty.

Ultimately, child protection not only safeguards the health and well-being of children, but also the positive future of our entire society.



OUR POSITION AND OUR PRINCIPLES

PRINCIPLE OF SUPPORTING PEOPLE TO SUSTAIN THEM-SELVES IN THE LONG TERM

BRAVEAURORA's projects do not create dependencies, but sustainable income opportunities to combat hunger and poverty. This can only work through a proper transfer of knowledge between the village population, local experts, employees and co-operation partners. For this reason, it is important to us to involve the village population in all project steps and to include them in all decisions.

SUSTAINABILITY PRINCIPLE

Sustainability is a key principle for BRAVEAU-RORA as we endeavour to create lasting positive impact. Our projects are designed in such a way that they can be continued even after our direct support has ended. We consciously rely on the involvement of local resources to ensure the sustainability of our measures. By closely involving local stakeholders, we ensure the long-term success of our projects and promote the independence of the population.

TRANSPARENCY PRINCIPLE

BRAVEAURORA stands for transparency and guarantees that every project donation is used 1:1 for the project work. Donors and sponsors are given the opportunity to track the use of their donations. Our financial report is audited every year by an independent auditor. In addition, we hold the Austrian seal of approval for donations since 2013, which requires an annual audit according to strict criteria.

CHALLENGES IN GHANA

Child protection and development co-operation in Northern Ghana are crucial to overcoming the many challenges the region is facing.

POVERTY AND HUNGER

Poverty is widespread in Northern Ghana and affects a large proportion of the population. Many families live below the poverty line and struggle to survive on a daily basis. In Northern Ghana, poverty rates in some districts are almost 70 per cent! This poverty leads to chronic hunger and malnutrition, especially in children, which affects their physical and mental development. Malnutrition weakens children's immune systems and makes them more susceptible to illness.

INADEQUATE INFRASTRUCTURE

In many parts of Ghana, especially in the north, there is a lack of basic infrastructure such as roads, electricity and water, which hampers economic development.

CLIMATE CHANGES

Climatic changes are exacerbating the already difficult living conditions in Northern Ghana. Irregular rainfall, frequent droughts and flooding affect agricultural production, which is the main source of livelihood for most families. These climate challenges lead to crop failures and exacerbate food insecurity and poverty in the region.



DEPENDENCE ON AGRICULTURE

The vast majority of the population in northern Ghana is dependent on agriculture. This dependence makes people particularly vulnerable to the effects of climate change and economic fluctuations. When harvests fail or prices for agricultural produce fall, many families lose their only source of income. This has a devastating impact on their ability to meet basic needs and provide adequately for their children.





THE NEED FOR CHILD PROTECTION

Under these challenging circumstances, children are particularly vulnerable. They are often victims of abuse, exploitation and neglect. The lack of education and health infrastructure further exacerbates their situation. Child labour is widespread, as families are forced to send their children to work to supplement their income. This deprives the children of the opportunity to go to school and receive an education, which considerably limits their future prospects.

This is what life is like for children in Ghana:

- One in five children is malnourished
- One in five children does not live with their parents
- More than 3,500 children live in institutions
- Almost 90% of children are exposed to psychological aggression, one in five children experience physical abuse
- Child labour affects one in five children
- One in five girls is married off as a child
- One in 50 girls is a victim of female genital mutilation
- Almost 75% of all children in Ghana are affected by poverty (Source: UNICEF Ghana)

Development co-operation and the protection of children in Northern Ghana are not only moral obligations, but also investments in a better and more sustainable future for the entire region. Together, we can help break the cycles of poverty and hardship and offer the people of Northern Ghana a more hopeful perspective.

GOALS:























OUR APPROACH

evelopment cooperation plays a central role in overcoming these challenges. Through targeted projects and programmes, we can sustainably improve the living conditions of people in Northern Ghana. Measures to improve agriculture, the development of educational and health facilities and special programmes to protect and support children are key components of our work.

Our commitment aims to strengthen the resilience of communities, reduce dependence on agriculture and create alternative sources of income. Through educational initiatives and

Our goals are based on the United Nations' 17 Sustainable Development Goals. These are to be implemented worldwide by 2030. In Ghana, we have focussed in particular on the following goals in 2023:

- 1. No poverty: A quarter of the Ghanaian population lives below the poverty line. In Northern Ghana, the poverty rate in some districts is almost at 70%! We want to end poverty in Northern Ghana!
- 2. Zero hunger: One in five children in Ghana is malnourished. Malnutrition leads to stunted growth, a weak immune system, impaired brain development and long-term health consequen-

ces. We want to end hunger, achieve food security, improve nutrition and promote sustainable agriculture.

- 3. Quality education: 84% of schoolaged children in Ghana go to school, but only 7% in can read when they graduate 3rd grade of primary school. We are committed to inclusive, equal and quality education in the underprivileged villages of Northern Ghana.
- 4. Gender equality: One in five girls in Ghana is married off as a child. 95% of girls in rural Ghana do not go to school when they have their period. All our projects therefore focus on girls and women in order to empower them and achieve gender equality.

5. Decent work and economic growth:

The rural population is heavily dependent on agriculture and yields are dependent on weather. Global climate change is reducing income opportunities. At the BRAVEAURORA training centre, people learn trades, set up their own businesses and thus promote the local economy.

6. Reduced inequalities: In Ghana, regional disparities between the North and the South are pronounced, particularly in terms of access to resources and socio-economic privileges. While the South benefits from better infrastructure, higher educational opportunities and greater economic opportunities, the North struggles with underdeveloped infrastructure and less access to education and health services, which further exacerbates inequality. Our projects aim to reduce inequality wit-

7. Partnerships for the goals: Together with many cooperation partners, local authorities and networks as well as international organisations, we are committed to achieving these goals.

Our work focuses on the areas of child protection, education and poverty reduction. We take into account the overarching issues of climate change, gender equality and social inclusion in all our projects. We work holistically, meaning that we approach these issues holistically and in their entirety in order to create sustainable and comprehensive solutions that improve the living conditions of people in Northern Ghana in the long term.

REINTEGRATION AND FIGHT AGAINST ILLEGAL ORPHANAGES

In Ghana, thousands of children live in orphanages. From 1996 to 2006, the number of orphanages increased from 23 to 148. There are currently an estimated 139 orphanages with around 3,500 children in the country. But why are so many children in Ghana orphaned? The answer is sad: poverty, discrimination, and benefit tourism.

ore and more volunteers want to do something good on their holiday and are prepared to pay a lot of money to do so. The bestseller of social tourism: working with orphans. But in recent years, demand has outstripped supply.

To satisfy the need of voluntourists, social orphans are created across orphanages. Two out of three children in Ghana, who live in an orphanage, are not orphans. Nevertheless, the best place for children to grow up is their own family, which gives them love and security.

BRAVEAURORA is therefore working with the Department of Social Welfare and other partners in Ghana to educate people about the dangers of orphanage-based care.

We do this through empowering individuals, families, communities, and child protection actors. Our empowerment efforts are to support proper gatekeeping and ensure that children enjoy love and protection in families.

MILESTONES

1) OUR YOUNG AMBASSADORS REACH 24 COMMUNITIES

The Young Ambassadors Project (YAP) which seeks to educate communities on the dangers associated with child harvesting and illegal residential care for children, reached out to 2,451 people across 24 communities within the year. This is a preventive approach to make families aware of the effects of giving out children to orphanages haphazardly.

The young people were trained as peers (multipliers = disseminators) and report from their own experience how negative orphanages can be for children and the advantages of growing up in a family.

2) REINTEGRATION OF 22 CHILDREN INTO THEIR FAMILIES

Current statistics show that over 121 orphanages with more than 3,540 children are still in operation in Ghana. In the northern regions of Ghana, where BRAVEAURORA works, there are at least 17 orphanages with around 500 children. In 2022, the Ghanaian Department of Social Welfare and BRAVEAURORA were able to reunite 22 children from five orphanages with their families.





3) CHILD PROTECTION IN EMERGENCIES TRAINING OF SUB-NATIONAL SOCIAL SERVICE WORKFORCE IN UPPER EAST REGION

The civil unrest in neighbouring Burkina Faso led to mass movement of families including children into the upper regions of Ghana. As a notable civil organization in Child Protection, BRAVEAURORA in collaboration with the Upper East regional departments of Social Welfare and Community Development with funding support from UNICEF, offered a refresher training for five districts on Social Welfare Information Management System (SWIMS). The refresher training built the capacities of 21 social workers from Bawku West, Binduri, Tempane, Pusiga and Garu district assemblies. The refresher training enabled the social workers to improve the profiling of asylum seekers within their territories and offer better case management services to 2000 children.

Samuel Apuuchogi, a social worker from Garu district assembly stated, "Through the training at SWIMS, our social workers were able to expand their skills to not only create more accurate demographic and psychosocial profiles of the asylum seekers, but also to address their individual needs more effectively. This leads to faster and more targeted support in times of crisis and improves coordination with other support services, which overall contributes to better and more sustainable care and integration of the affected children and their families."

4) "GIRLS FOR MENSTRUAL HYGIENE MANAGEMENT" PROJECT - BREAKING MENSTRUAL TABOOS

According to a local study, 95% of girls in Ghana do not go to school when they have their period! Periods are therefore often a reason why girls do not perform well at school (due to the many absences) or drop out of school and thus their careers! Due to this alarmingly high number, the "Girls for Menstrual Hygiene Management (Girls4MHM)" was initiated in cooperation with ORA International Austria. The project aims to break menstrual taboos and improve girls' school performance. The project directly benefits 240 girls between the ages of 14 and 25 from 12 communities, i.e. 20 girls from each village. Each community has a girls' club with a mentor who uses manuals to educate girls about sexual health and rights and encourage open discussion. The clubs are safe spaces for girls and young women where they can talk about their questions about menstruation, but also about gender roles, youth protection or their professional future.






5) BRAVE ACTION FOR CHILD PROTECTION-BRAVEAURORA PRODUCES FOUR CHILD **PROTECTION MANUALS**

Thanks to the dedicated support of our volunteer Sophia Kamleitner, an experienced nurse, we were able to create four important manuals for our child protection programme. These manuals cover essential topics: Girls' Clubs, Parent Education and Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights. The aim of these manuals is to maximise the reach of our projects and actively involve the village communities in their implementation. Volunteers from the villages are trained to utilise these valuable resources on site. To date, 13 committed contact persons from our partner communities have already successfully completed these training courses and are now passing on the knowledge to their communities.

6) BRAVEAURORA IS HONOURED BY WEST MAMPRUSI MUNICIPAL **ASSEMBLY**

For the wonderful work in protecting children and uplifting numerous families and communities, the West Mamprusi Municipal Assembly honoured BRAVEAURORA with a citation.





SUCCESS STORY (G4MHM PROJECT)

eet Fatimah, an 18-year-old seamstress and a proud member of the Girls' Club in Diani.

excitement about being part of the Girls' Club and the significant impact the project has had on her life. By attending the Girls' Club she learnt how to sew reusable pads, and she has been making them for herself, her family, and friends ever since.

Additionally, Fatimah has gained knowledge from the girls' club's bi-weekly meetings. She can manage menstrual pain without using drugs, saving her money and avoiding the harmful In an interview, Fatimah shared her effects of drugs. She also no longer buys disposable pads, which are environmentally unfriendly and costly. Moreover, Fatimah has learned how to maintain hygiene during menstruation and carry herself with dignity and confidence. "My menstruation is not a barrier to cooking, participation in farmwork, attending social gatherings and school", Fatimah acknowledges.

Fight against malnutrition







We visited the family of one of the **40 children** who benefited from the **Feeding Hope Project 2024**. The parents told us how their son got back on his feet with the help of the supplementary food which BRAVEAURORA provided. The impact of BRAVEAURORA's support was particularly noticeable here.



FIGHT AGAINST MALNUTRITION FEEDING HOPE PROJECT

Poverty and therefore malnutrition among children have been declining globally since 2000, but extreme poverty is now rising again for the first time in Ghana due to the coronavirus pandemic, the war in Ukraine and the economic and inflation crisis. Millions of people have been plunged into abject poverty.

ne in five children in Ghana is malnourished, i.e. too small for their age and underweight. Malnutrition leads to stunted growth, a weak immune system, inhibited brain development and long-term health consequences. Malnourished children tire quickly, have little energy and no strength to play and learn.

In 2023, our team became aware of a family with a severely malnourished child. The mother wanted to do an apprenticeship at our training centre to improve her family's income situation. However, when our social worker saw the child during a home visit, he was immediately taken to hospital, where he was diagnosed with severe malnutrition. The child was hospitalised and recovered but died at home after being discharged. The consequences of the malnutrition had been too severe over a long period of time.

After this experience, BRAVEAURORA initiated the Feeding Hopes Project which seeks to empower malnourished children by providing acute care in hospital, therapeutic food and educational work. In doing so, we aim to reduce malnutrition in children under five years in the West Mamprusi Municipality.

Through the project, a baseline study to determine areas of higher incidence of malnutrition in children within the Municipality was conducted. This was crucial for the selection of the villages in which BRAVEAURORA was to become active. The survey gave the team an insight into the existing measures taken by state institutions to combat malnutrition and helped to identify the causes and contributing factors. These insights were important to increase participation in the project in the beneficiary communities and increase the sustainability of the project.



MILESTONES

1) BRAVEAUORA MAPPED OUT KEY STAKEHOLDERS AND ENGAGED THEM IN AN INCEPTION FORUM FOR THE PROJECT.

Notable stakeholders were the Municipal Director for Department of Social Welfare and Community Development, Municipal Nutrition Officer, Representative of the Medical Superintendent, and the Nutrition Officer for the Walewale Municipal Hospital, Health Care Workers from Shelinvoya, as well as the representatives of the Kparigu Traditional Area. The ideas and inputs of these resourceful individuals were taken onboard to guide the implementation of the feeding hopes project. The inception forum was also a platform to build partnerships and collaborative effectively for the success of the project.

2) THE FEEDING HOPES PRO-JECT BENEFITED 40 CHILDREN IN 2023, WHO SUFFERED FROM MILD, MODERATE AND SEVERE MALNUTRITION.

These children received medical care, therapeutic feed, counselling and support. All the children are on the highway to full recovery.

3) CAPACITIES OF 12 HEALTH CARE WORKERS HAVE BEEN BUILT THROUGH THE FEEDING HOPES PROJECT.

These health care workers are now better equipped to handle malnutrition cases in their various facilities.

SUCCESS STORY MARIAM: FIGHTING AGAINST TIME

ariam, a six-month-old girl, and her family were faced with a life-threatening situation. A volunteer from the health centre in the community of Shelinvoya drew BRAVEAURORA's attention to her desperate condition. At an initial assessment, the BRAVEAUORA nurse revealed that Mariam had not been able to breastfeed for two days, and the family had run out of therapeutic feed. The little girl was immediately rushed to the Shelinvoya clinic to be stabilised before onward referral to Walewale Municipal Hospital.

The diagnosis was shattering. Mariam was severely malnourished and was additionally ill with malaria, which explained her losing appetite. Mariam received life-saving medication and therapeutic feed during her one week stay in the hospital.

Thanks to BRAVEAURORA'S quick and comprehensive intervention, Mariam recovered and is growing to a healthy girl. Her father expressed his deep gratitude, "Mariam would've died if BRAVEAURORA had not helped. I did everything I could, but nothing was working. Thank you for saving my girl's life."





SUCCESS STORIES (FIGHT AGAINST MALNUTRITION): BRAYEAURORA SAYES LIVES

auzia, a dedicated public health nutritionist at Walewale Municipal Hospital, was facing a severe challenge when the support from UNICEF and China Aid for malnourished children's formula feed and therapeutic food ended in 2022. The cost of therapeutic feed was too expensive to afford for most parents and the counselling for affected families yielded only little impact.

Suddenly, hope emerged. BRAVEAURORA's Feeding Hopes Project aims at supporting malnourished children and their families. This initiative has been a real game-changer. BRAVEAURORA provided resources for therapeutic feed, medication, home visits and even workshops for health care workers. The partnership between the hospital and BRAVEAURORA has saved the

lives of 40 malnourished children! Whenever a case of malnourishment arises, the hospital contacts BRAVEAURORA.

Through BRAVEAURORA's support the hospital was able to provide the necessary feed but has as well facilitated outreach work in the communities, identifying and referring cases to the hospital.



Education as key to a better future

We spoke to teenagers and young adults who have been able to complete school and later university thanks to a BRAVEAURORA scholarship. In total, BRAVEAURORA has already reached **3.500 pupils** in Northern Ghana with its educational programmes.

EDUCATION AS KEY TO A BETTER FUTURE

Every child should have the same opportunity for education and the development of their own potential. Education enables economic improvement, democratic co-determination, and a self-determined life.











MILESTONES

1) CONTINUING EDUCATION WORKSHOPS FOR 67 TEACHERS

A total of 67 teachers were trained in 2023 in modern teaching and learning methodologies, to teach the curriculum more effectively.

2) PROVISION OF DUAL DESKS TO SAGADUGU JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL

BRAVEAURORA supplied 25 dual desks for the Sagadugu Junior High School, so that students do not have to sit on windows and the bare floor during instruction hours anymore.

3) EXTRA CLASSES FOR 432 STUDENTS

Tutoring was organized for 432 elementary and middle school students to support children with basic reading and numeracy.

4) TEACHING MATERIAL DONATIONS TO TEACHERS

350 copies of textbooks together with assorted learning materials were distributed to BRAVEAURORA partner schools.

5) SCHOLARSHIPS FOR 9 PARTICULARLY TALENTED STUDENTS

In 2023, nine students received financial support to advance their senior high school and university. Many thanks to our former project manager Severin Schwaiger, for supporting three of these students in senior high schools.




HEADLINE CORRECT?

The BRAVEAURORA Livelihood Program was originally initiated to help the children in the former orphanage. Many of these children were social orphans whose parents were unable to provide for them for financial reasons.



It offers training, promotes micro-enterprises and creates jobs to strengthen families and keep children in their families. Participants learn to provide for themselves and their families independently. After completing the programme, they receive start-up kits to set up their own businesses and can use microloans to expand existing businesses.









MOBILE SKILLS TRAINING -MOST

fter training more than 1,000 people at the Guabuliga training centre, BRAVEAURORA introduced the Mobile Skills Training (MoST) approach. This mobile approach enables people to complete their training directly where they live. This also prevents a village from becoming oversaturated with certain professions/skills.

Before training begins, a thorough mapping exercise is carried out in the communities to determine the exact entrepreneurial needs. As soon as it is clear which training courses are needed, suitable trainers are recruited.

The training takes place directly in the communities, which strengthens community participation and a sense of belonging. The village provides the venue and accommodation for the trainers, while BRAVEAURORA provides all other necessary resources.

MILESTONES

1) GRADUATION CEREMONY HELD IN GUABULIGA

In November 2023, 733 beneficiaries from 13 different communities graduated from the BRAVEAURORA livelihoods promotion program. This event marked one of the remarkable days in Guabuliga and BRAVEAURORA. The Municipal Chief Executive (MCE), that is the Representative of the President of Ghana for the West Mamprusi Municipality graced the occasion and emphasised BRAVEAURORA's impact in developing the region.

The event was also captured and broadcasted by a local television station. This event was an impressive demonstration of how BRAVEAURORA is changing the lives of many people and creating a sustainable future for entire communities.

2) 132 STARTER PACKS DISTRIBUTED

Successful graduates of the BRAVEAURO-RA training courses received customised start-up starter packs containing materials and information for setting up a business. Each starter pack was customised and included seminars on business start-up, finance, marketing, design, packaging and successful business management. In addition, the graduates received practical resources for their new business, such as beads and needles, tools, footwear or ingredients for soap making.

The 132 recipients had completed one to six months of training with craftspeople in trades of their choice such as bead making, soap making, soya processing, bakery, shoemaking and smock tailoring.




3) STATE CERTIFICATION THE TRAINING - 100% SUCCESS RATE SO FAR!

BRAVEAURORA works together with the NVTI, the state institute for vocational training, to issue official certificates to graduates. Graduates can demonstrate their knowledge in qualifying exams and, after successfully passing the exam, are given the opportunity to work independently or as an employee. We are proud that all 26 weavers and 16 hairdressers passed their exams in 2023.



4) BUSINESS MENTORING FOR 150 NEW ENTRE-PRENEURS

In 2023, the livelihoods promotion program accompanied 150 entrepreneurs to evaluate their progress in self-employment and help them with difficulties in the world of work. We offer business advisory support services for those who are struggling to keep their businesses in operation.


